Volunteers Needed for Annual Bicycle and Pedestrian Counts

Bicyclists and Pedestrians: As you know, our community is making a great effort to make Eugene a more walkable and bikeable city. We need your help to count bicyclists and pedestrians along our paths and streets. Your help is critical in measuring existing use and evaluating the progress made over past years. Counting bicyclists and pedestrians is a great way to help out with the city's overall effort to make Eugene a great city for walking and biking with a small time commitment -- and you even get to be outside! Volunteers from previous years said it was fun, educational and passing walkers, runners and bicyclists were very excited that counts were happening.

We are looking for people to do weekday and Saturday counts on a sunny day in May. Weekday AM counts are from 7 - 9 AM and PM counts from 4 - 6 PM. Saturday counts are from 12 - 2 PM.

If you are interested in doing a bicycle/pedestrian count (or even two), please contact Lee Shoemaker at 682-5471 or at lee.shoemaker@ci.eugene.or.us for more details. If you haven't previously volunteered to count pedestrians and bicyclists, there will be a short 15-30 minute to go over the count forms and general instructions.

Bike Parking in Eugene – Bike Corrals Coming Soon

How can we improve the pedestrian environment, increase parking capacity in front of local businesses and improve visibility – all at a relatively low cost? One way to accomplish these

often competing goals is to install a new type of bike parking facility called a bike corral. These on-street bike parking facilities help improve the pedestrian environment by opening up space that may have been used previously for bike racks installed in the sidewalk. And, they increase parking capacity by fitting up to 14 bikes in the space that was occupied by a single automobile. For some businesses, that's a huge increase in customer parking!

The City of Eugene's Transportation Planning Team is currently working with partners from City Parking Services, Permitting and Traffic Operations to develop a program to manage the installation and maintenance of bike corrals in Eugene. Modeled after other successful examples, Eugene's bike corral program will rely on a collaborative partnership between interested private businesses and the City of Eugene. Eugene Earns Top Five Ranking in List of Most Bike-Friendly Cities in America

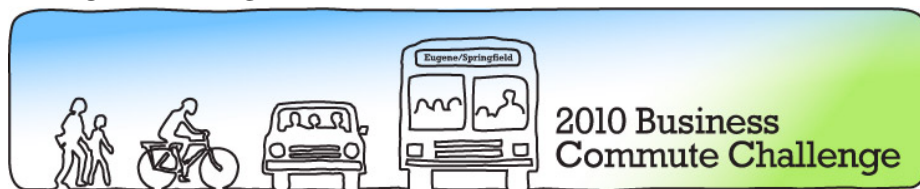
Ample bike parking, lit bike paths, and the Smart Ways to School program are just three of the reasons Eugene has been named the No. 5 most bike-friendly city in America by *Bicycling* magazine. The world's largest bicycling magazine today announced its ranking of the 50 most bike-friendly cities in the U.S. The top five, in order, are Minneapolis, Minnesota; Portland, Oregon; Boulder, Colorado; Seattle, Washington; and Eugene.

According to the magazine, the rankings pay homage to cities that have shown real innovation, as well as local government support and a vibrant bike culture. "This year's list is evidence that a much-needed, far-reaching pro-bike movement is in full swing, all across the country," said Loren Mooney, Editor-in-Chief of *Bicycling*.

To compile the list, *Bicycling* editors considered cities with populations of 100,000 or more. They used factors such as cycling-friendly statistics (numbers of bike lanes and routes, bike racks, city projects completed and planned), changes in these statistics and a city's future plans since the last survey. They also took into account the bike culture (number of bike commuters, cycling clubs, cycling events, renowned bike shops). Editors also referenced the *Bicycling and Walking in the United States 2010 Benchmarking Report* prepared by the Alliance for Biking and Walking, the League of American Bicyclists' Bicycle Friendly America project, and interviews with national and local advocates, bike shops, and other experts.

Eugene has 153 miles of paths, bike lanes and bike routes and a well-developed City bicycle education program, including the Eye-to-Eye traffic safety campaign and a well-organized Safe Routes to Schools program. In 2009, those factors helped Eugene earn a gold-level bike designation by the League of American Bicyclists. May is Walk + Bike Challenge Month!

Adults aren't the only ones getting in on the "[Commute Challenge](#)". Twelve local area schools and more than 100 from throughout Oregon are competing against one another in the [Walk + Bike Challenge Month](#) throughout May. This statewide event is a friendly competition that encourages students to walk and bike to school for the whole month of May. In 2009, 60 schools and over 4,000 individuals participated in the event. For the first time this year Eugene schools are competing and the competition has also opened to high schools and universities. Older students have access to the online trip-tracking system used for the BTA's Bike Commute Challenge, which allows them to compare mileage and challenge their friends.

School coordinators at elementary and middle schools help students track their trips on the Challenge poster or scorecard and the the school with the highest percentage of walking and biking in the Eugene/Springfield area will win \$500 for their schools P.E. program or active transportation projects.

Tire & Tube recycling UPDATE from Jeff Willensky

Three shops are currently recycling their used tires & tubes:

- WheelWorks
- Blue Heron
- Arriving by Bike

It costs the shop between \$.50 and \$1.00 to recycle the tire. The shops are also accepting tires & tubes from non-customers, for a recycling fee.

Another development is that a local tire company, The Tire Factory, Eugene is taking bundled tires & tubes, for a fee, and putting them on their trailer to Portland to get recycled (RB Recycling). This is an important component, as it reduces the cost of transporting the tires & tubes I covered in my previous trips to Portland. I am very pleased to have found a partner in this program! Volunteers Needed for BTA Bike Education in the Schools – May & June

My name is Clare Gordon and I am the new Bicycle Transportation Alliance Bike Safety Educator for the Eugene/Springfield area. I am super excited to get things started and get involved with the bike community here in Eugene. For those of you who are not familiar with the program, I will be teaching the BTA's Bike Safety curriculum to 5th-8th grader classes here in Eugene. At the end of each two week class, we will be going on community rides with the students to practice all the things we cover in the class! These rides are where the community can really get involved. We will need volunteers for the rides as we will have 25-35 students on each community ride. The volunteers are a critical piece of making the rides fun, safe, and successful! We can also use volunteers during our intersection practice days, to help students with stops and right and left turns. As part of the West Eugene EmX Extension Design Options (“WEEEDO”) project, the City of Eugene and Lane Transit District are hosting an open house to present potential site specific conceptual designs for several areas along the proposed West Eugene EmX Extension routes. The public is invited to hear the details of the project and provide input on the designs.

The WEEEDO project explores possible site-specific design enhancements that can be incorporated into the West Eugene EmX project, such as pedestrian and bicycle crossings, and streetscape enhancements. These enhancements were suggested through public input on the project. The WEEEDO study area does not include the entire West Eugene area; it is limited to the area between the Eugene LTD Station on the east and Garfield Street on the west. The WEEEDO project does not modify the routing options.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

Paving in the City

Paving projects around town will start as early as May and continue through the summer. Currently, there are 24 signs that identify local gas tax and street bond-funded rehabilitation or reconstruction projects. The idea to place signs far in advance of the work came from the

citizen Street Repair Review Panel. This is one way for people to take a closer look at the streets that are getting fixed before they're under construction.

Paving signage will also serve as a reminder to area residents that they may want to consider alternate routes once roadwork begins. I-5 Willamette River Bridge Construction Update

Weekly construction update - Activities for the week of May 3, 2010

- I-5 northbound off-ramp to Franklin Boulevard closed through July 1.
- Canoe Canal Path under I-5 is re-opened for east/west path users.
- North Bank Path under I-5 is closed to east/west path users.
- Erection of the falsework for the bridge arches continues this week on the north bank of the Willamette River.
- The outline of the arches should start to be seen in the next few weeks.
- Watch for flaggers and expect delays on the South Bank and North Bank Paths.
- Watch for increased construction traffic in and around the park as materials are delivered and construction occurs at various bridge locations.
- North Walnut Road located west of I-5 is closed to the public for the duration of the project so that crews can use it as an access road. Walnut Road in Eastgate Woodlands in the Whilamut Natural Area is closed at the junction with the North Bank Path on the east side of I-5.
- Bicyclists are subject to the same rules as other motorists; this includes doubling of fines in construction zones for not obeying flaggers or riding on a closed road or path. Closures and delays are necessary for the protection and safety of people using the paths, as well as construction workers.
- The fenced area near the bridge in Alton Baker Park is a staging area for contractors.
- Roadside work crews and construction vehicles will enter and exit the travel lanes at the intersection of Franklin Boulevard and Jenkins Drive.

Fern Ridge Path Rehabilitation – Summer 2010

The Fern Ridge Path Project will rehabilitate/reconstruct major portions of the Fern Ridge Path between Chambers and Van Buren St. (W-E) and between 16th and 18th avenues (N-S). There will also be construction on the path connecting 22nd Ave. to the Arts and Technology Academy. The City plans to conduct this project in July and August of 2010, while the 4J schools are on summer break. During construction, major sections of the path will be closed (there are convenient detours available). The project is currently in the design phase and therefore construction phasing and scheduling have not been determined. It will be our intent to keep path closures as short as possible, but construction will significantly impact path uses this coming summer. Ride of Silence – May 16

When: Sun, May 16, 6:45pm – 8:00pm

Where: Erb memorial union, UO ([map](#))

Description: Cyclists will take to the roads in a silent procession to honor cyclists who have been killed or injured while cycling on public roadways. Although cyclists have a legal right to share the road with motorists, the motoring public often isn't aware of these rights, and sometimes not aware of the cyclists themselves. In 2003, Chris Phelan organized the first Ride of Silence in Dallas after endurance cyclist Larry Schwartz was hit by the mirror of a passing bus and was killed. The Ride of Silence is a free ride that asks its cyclists to ride no faster than 12 mph and remain silent during the ride. There are no sponsors and no registration fees. The ride, which is held during National Bike Month, aims to raise the awareness of motorists, police and city officials that cyclists have a legal right to the public roadways. The ride is also a chance to show respect for those who have been killed or injured.

The form will ask for some brief information about the pothole, including its location (if on the path, try to give as much location info as possible). There's also a place for you to provide your contact information. If you would prefer, you can call Public Works Maintenance at 541-682-4800 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and file the report over the phone.

If you'd like to follow up with the City after making a pothole request, just send an email to pwmaintenance@ci.eugene.or.us with the word "pothole" in the subject line.

(Please remember that Eugene Public Works only repairs potholes on streets/paths in the city of Eugene. We will make a field inspection of every reported pothole within two business days. In many cases we will immediately fill the pothole; however, in some cases we may choose to wait to schedule an alternate treatment such as maintenance overlay. FMI: go to www.eugene-or.gov/pothole)
